


PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION OF ARWS



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From the Secretary's Desk

Dear Friends.

The work of Anriban Rural Welfare Society at Bhadura and Haridas Gram Panchayat in Diamond Harbour—II Block in South 24 Parganas district in West Bengal, has continued to grow during the past year. The organization in the year 2000 started with 30 children who were child labourers and with the commitment and dedication of the staff, volunteers and the community, has brought visible growth to the vision reaching out to 500 children/youth and 50,000 people directly through right based intervention programmes in Education, Health, Skill Enhancement and Livelihood.



We have been firm in pursuing our values, recognizing our shortcomings and we have been open to new learning and experiences from the communities. To make the Millennium development goals a reality, the quality of these children's childhood and adulthood is greatly dependent on the responses of people with a sense of individual and corporate social responsibility (CSR).

We are providing quality education to the children in eight villages and trying to uplift their life through education. Since we are true believers of Gandhian thoughts, we are striving hard to educate all the children in the area and help them improve their living conditions. Apart from that we also provide health care services, livelihood training and support, mental health counseling support to the children, adolescents, women and backward classes with the aim to change their lives and to support the better living.

Our future action plan is to empower children, youth and women through education, skill enhancement, and health care and livelihood facilities to make better citizen. We express our thanks to the people we work for, as well as to the individuals, other government and non-governmental agencies that have helped us to serve the community better. About Us:

Anirban Rural Welfare Society is a voluntary social service organization for social action and economic development in an integrated manner. The organization was established by a group of committed volunteers comprising of teachers, doctors, social workers and statisticians for providing assistance and support towards betterment of the landless poor, who are deprived, exploited and thus forced to lead their lives in a deplorable condition. The group initiated a Social Service Bureau, to help the distressed to regain self-confidence and thus a chance to improve their livelihood and their lives. The methodology adopted was to listen to them patiently and design programmes according to their needs. This was done through human relations, personal attention and counselling for beneficiaries. The society started its activities in 2000 and was registered in the same year under the West Bengal Societies Registration Act 1961, on the basis of their activities.

ARWS works with the people as a co-partner of the community and plays a role as per their problems, needs and aspirations.

As a communicator: Helping people to articulate their aspirations, develop their ideas in a structured manner and translate them into a language for easy understanding and identification by the community.

As a facilitator: Giving suggestions and ideas about community development and facilitating a collective approach with response to community problems and needs.

As a change agent: For awareness generation in people on need-based socio-economic issues taking into account relevant surrounding situations thus creating their inner urge for united action towards a better status, through internal change and community enrichment without outside influence and interference.

As a community organiser: Helping the community form self-help groups, creating the values of self-respect, self-dignity, self-reliance and sense of social responsibility for need-based training and sharing.

As a support group: Generating people's feedback, strengthening base-level receiving/utilising mechanism, promoting effective pressure groups that can benefit from government delivery mechanisms.

As a networking instrument: Promoting organisational management abilities among different grassroots level groups, village committees, mahila mandals, youth clubs, etc., developing leadership qualities of their core members, channelling group efforts to solve common issues that they are most concerned about. Assisting community based organisations to equip their key personnel with necessary skills and knowledge through training that is suitable to their work and working environment. Since its inception, ARWS has made a significant impact on the areas like education, healthcare services, women's empowerment, skill enhancement training, entrepreneurship development, family counselling, rural development and environment as well.

Reaching out to Children and Women in Need:

ARWS aspires to improve access to education, counselling, healthcare, potable water and safe sanitation with a focus on children and women from disadvantaged and vulnerable sections of society. This ensures that they grow up to be physically and mentally healthy, confident and self-respecting. The aim is to mobilise resourses for a participatory development strategy to improve socio-economic indicators through effective management of locally available resources.

Skill Enhancement for Livelihood

ARWS mobilises resources to provide financial support services to youth and women from disadvantaged backgrounds to enable viable income generation initiatives. This enables the beneficiaries to alleviate their poverty and thus motivates the community. This leads to the formation of community-based Self Help Groups, thereby enhancing their capacity and capability to effectively participate in local development programmes in the areas of income generation.

Education:



Objectives:

- To provide preliminary education through play method in early learning centers.
- To provide supplementary nutritional support to children from the age group of 1 ½ years to 18 years.
- To mainstream them into formal schooling.
- To provide educational support to children so that they can complete their education.
- To protect children from child labour.
- · To increase community awareness about child rights and child protection through advocacy.
- To improve access to existing Government resources by network building and advocacy.

Activities:

- · Play way method of teaching in early learning centers.
- Nutritional support to children.
- Monthly health & hygiene check up, height weight checkup and to provide necessary medicines to the children along with psychological support.
- · Regular ongoing remedial education and main streaming support.
- Regular recreational support for holistic development.
- · Monthly mothers meeting.
- Community awareness programmes on various issues related to mothers and children.
- Monthly parents meetings where the parents are sensitised about the need for their children's education.
- Formation and maintenance of local accounts that would be their own bank account and SHG accounts where the mothers can save the money for their child's education.
- Formation of 2 Peer Groups to receive training on six issues, which include: the need for education, motivation, child rights, child protection, and gender discrimination in child education, leadership and communication.
- Monthly Peer Group meetings on child protection and rights issues.
- Advocacy meeting with NGOs by Peer Groups on child rights & protection issue.
- Training to Peer Groups on networking and existing systems and educating society in favour of child rights and protection.

Education:



Activities:

- Inter-school debates organized by Peer Groups.
- Social mapping to identify under-served and un-served pockets in the operational areas.
- · Stakeholders' sensitization training sessions, to sensitise stakeholders each year.
- Awareness camps per month to sensitise the general community through street play, video show, rallies, etc.
- Enrolment camps to organise send the children straight to formal school.
- Improving access to existing government resources by network building and advocacy.

Achievements:

- First floor of a school building has been constructed in collaboration with 'Vital For Children' and well-lit and ventilated classrooms have been added so that the students can get a better environment to study.
- Halogen lights have been installed in the pathways to the coaching centre for the safety of the girl students.
- · Battery driven study lamps were distributed among the students for uninterrupted learning
- 5 students have appeared for secondary Board Examination and 10 students have appeared for Higher Secondary Board Examinations and all of them have passed successfully.
- The families of the sponsored students were provided with husbandry as a financial aid for their livelihood.
- 50 children were mainstreamed in Government school belonging to age group of 6 years onwards.
- 50 malnourished children were getting nutritious food and their height and weight have increased.
- 50 mothers have been trained on hygiene practices with their children and the overall attitude towards the importance of education among these parents was improved
- 500 children are receiving education, counselling, nutritional and recreational support and have been promoted to the next level (class).
- 2 peer groups have been formed with 24 children for awareness on child rights and child protection. 1580 people were present for this programme.
- Children were provided with text books to help them in their higher studies.
- 130+ girls were sponsored for educational development. They were provided with supporting educational materials; additionally, 10 girls were provided bicycles to reach school from interior villages as they were in secondary level.
- 130+ malnourished children were provided on regular basis with cereals, rice, cooking oil, nutritional drinks and hygiene materials.

Education - Success Stories:

Success Story 1: Name - Mamoni Mondal

Situation before intervention:

The social concept in Kashipur village is that the boys should start earning as soon as possible and girls should be married off as early as possible. The social thought process is archaic and investing time and energy into studies or gaining degrees is not considered a priority. Mamoni is dependent on her parents, her father is a daily wage earner who works at construction sites, and for that, he is paid once in a month.



Intervention made:

Since 2000, the year in which ARWS was founded, our organization has arranged for village meetings and socio economic reform awareness camps, to make the villagers understand the value of education and how it can change their lives. The most effective intervention method was the distribution of books and notebooks and setting up a free remedial coaching center where both boys and girls are welcome. The organization also encouraged and helped the parents to fill the school forms to send their wards to school, and also took it upon itself to monitor the students' attendance. ARWS also facilitated the distribution of books and notebooks to all the students. Many children in the village have enrolled in our remedial coaching center and they were taught free of cost and were also given books.

Turning Point:

The turning point in Mamoni Mondal's life came when she became associated with us and we started monitoring her educational progress regularly and guiding her at every step. Our remedial coaching center turned out to be a boon in disguise, because she had free access to our teachers who were most willing to explain concepts to her and clear her doubts and explain the subjects in the simplest form so that Mamoni could understand and retain what she had learnt. This support and the availability of books helped her reach her present status.

Challenges faced & overcome: Young Mamoni Mondal has overcome hardships like lack of electricity, the lack of a conducive environment to study, the regressive attitude of neighbours and her family towards education. In the past, whenever she used to ask her parents for educational material, they were not able to provide her with the same for months. This was de-motivating her and she was often driven to tears.

Present Status:

Present Status: Now after the support of Anirban, Mamoni Mondal has completed her graduation and has started pursuing her post-graduation. Mamoni is now also working with the organisation as a teacher.

Education - Success Stories:

Success Story 2: Name - Sakina Khatun

Situation before intervention:

Like many other villages across India the people in her village were of the firm opinion that a boy must start earning as soon as possible, preferably by the age 12 and girls should be married off as soon as they reach puberty.



Intervention made:

ARWS was founded in the year 2000; since then our organization has conducted village meetings, socio-economic reform awareness camps and health and hygiene camps every month. In these meetings, locally influential community members were invited and were informed about the importance of education and the various benefits associated with it. Counselling sessions were conducted on job opportunities in the government and private sectors. ARWS also helped parents fill up school forms and encouraged parents to send their wards to school, and also took it upon itself to monitor the attendance. All the village boys and girls were enrolled into our remedial school and they were taught free of cost and were also provided with educational stationery.

Turning Point:

The fruits of the education awareness programme became visible from 2005, when a larger number of girls were being allowed to attend classes in the secondary section. Before this awareness campaign, it was impossible for the girls to even imagine continuing their education beyond class 7. For us this was a turning point!

Challenges faced & overcome:

Our champion Sakina Khatun had to overcome many obstacles partially because she was from a conservative Muslim family. There was a lot of opposition from her family and society; as per the Muslim community, the study of Islam is enough and no formal schooling is needed, but Sakina fought against this traditionalism through a systematic approach, she first brought her parents to meet us and made them attend the educational awareness programmes. Despite being a first generation learner Sakina scored good marks, and continued passing in each class, our councillors made her parents aware of the benefits of education. Other than monitoring her educational progress and providing guidance and support ARWS also provided her with school stationery.

Present Status:

Now Sakina Khatun by her sheer will power and determination has reached the second year of a degree course in History honours. After completing her degree course he plans to enrol for a master's course in History. She is our education awareness ambassador and takes part in all our activities.

Education - Success Stories:

Success Story 3: Name: Monisha Sardar

Situation before intervention:

Monisha is from a disadvantaged family, which comprises of four members. Her father is a daily wage labourer who works in the construction industry and the mother tries to support the family by doing embroidery jobs. In Gondia village where the family resides, 90% of the male population work as daily wage labourers. The main purpose of the villagers is to make their sons employable and to get the girls married off as soon as possible. The general concept is that earning money itself is the end of all miseries.



Intervention made:

Since its inception in 2000, our organization has conducted village meetings, socio economic reform awareness camps and health and hygiene camps every month. In these meetings, locally influential community members were invited and were informed about the importance of education and the various benefits associated with it. Counselling sessions were conducted on job opportunities in the government and private sectors. ARWS also helped parents fill up school forms and encouraged parents to send their wards to school, and also took it upon itself to monitor the attendance. All the village boys and girls were enrolled into our remedial school and they were taught free of cost and were also provided with educational stationery.

Turning Point:

Due to the non-availability of school stationery, Monisha was always depressed. During an awareness programme, Monisha approached ARWS for an educational sponsorship to help her continue her education. This decision taken by Monisha was the turning point of her life; we considered her requested and we streamlined a supply of books and notebooks to her; along with this, we asked her to attend our remedial school in the mornings and afternoons where she could avail of free educational support.

Challenges faced & overcome:

Young Monisha Sardar has overcome hurdles unlike many of her peers. She realised the importance of education and decided that taking care of the house and family cannot be the only priority. She continued coming to our remedial classes in the morning and passing one exam after another. She still has to do the domestic chores as per the prevalent custom in her village, but she does not ignore her studies. We are very happy that Monisha was determined enough to balance both and achieve her goal. Now she has completed the 1st year of her degree course in science.

Present Status:

Monisha Sardar is very happy going to college and is eagerly looking forward to completing her graduation.

Community Health Care - Promoting health seeking behaviours in South 24 Parganas in rural areas through awareness, action, access and advocacy.

Project Status:

The project is planned in two village areas of Gondia and Kashipur that are covered through this programme. Its primary focus was to improve the health of communities below the poverty line. Our intervention strategy is based on four strands

I) Awareness ii) Action iii) Access iv) Advocacy

Aim and objectives:

The project is facilitated in two villages Gondia and Kashipur, building a consortium of action groups which work to meet the health needs of the community. During our intervention we have used needs based and rights based approaches to improve the health status of the population in the respective villages.

Our objectives Included:

- Promoting awareness on healthcare, illness prevention, treatment and government services and schemes.
- Empowering communities to take ownership and responsibility over their own health
- Facilitating and provide access to healthcare services
- Advocating for improved water and sanitation amenities and improved health services.

Target Groups:

- · Mothers and children
- · Adolescent boys and girls

Specific Focus of the Project during the period:

- Awareness camps on health and hygiene and Water borne disease.
- · Health clinics for mothers, children and adolescents.
- Health awareness camps and clinics on breast cancer awareness, tuberculosis, dengue and malaria.




Report on Community Health Care

Positive Achievements:


- Access to fifteen clinics were organized where a total of 1588 patients were treated out of which 1100 patients were female, 473 were male and 17 were other gender.
- 415 Children were treated; they came to the clinic with ailments like allergy, body pain, cough and cold, fever, headache, indigestion, injury, loss of appetite, malnourishment, worms, diarrhea, vomiting and jaundice.
- 227 adolescents were treated for fever; menstrual pain; typhoid; ear, eye and hair infections, weakness, malaria, dengue, abdominal pain and sprains.
- 748 adults were treated for allergy, body pain, blood pressure (BP), cough and cold, dermatitis, fever, headache, indigestion, inflammation, injury, loss of appetite, malaise, menstrual problems, nausea, sleep deprivation and weakness, abdominal pain breast lumps, dengue, malaria and tuberculosis.
- Awareness Programme on health and hygiene, malaria and vitamin deficiencies was attended by 301 individuals, out of which 82 mothers and children were treated with multi vitamins and folic acid tablets. 9 mothers were referred to a hospital for mammography as lumps were present in their breasts.
- 213 women attended STD and RTI awareness camp from Gondia and Kashipur villages.
- Through Advocacy 67 children below the age of two were networked with integrated child development center (ICDS).
- Through Advocacy 71 adults were sent to DOT center of the government hospital for tuberculosis counseling and treatment.
- Doctors and health workers spread awareness on taking precautions against dengue and malaria.
- Action building with local leaders, local Panchayat members & the community which
 resulted in a good response for our rural health camps in villages. The people who
 underwent treatment in our health camps expressed their fullest satisfaction towards
 our treatment & medicines.






Gender Wise Patient Data:




Number of patients treated - age group wise:




Disease Profile (Age Group):

Healthcare - Out Patient Diagnostic Department.

Out Patient Diagnostic Department

ARWS' Out Patient Diagnosis strives to ensure the holistic medical treatment of under-served people surviving below the poverty-line in and around South 24 Parganas district, who would otherwise be deprived of necessary medical treatment. The OPD building was established in October 2017 to specifically cater to the Out-Patients Department, Diagnostic Centre and mobile outreach reaching out to the rural population. The OPD structure was designed so that each of these disciplines can support each other, to ensure that patients receive a high-quality service. ARWS OPD operates on an ability to pay basis; in most cases the patients are from BPL families. This was funded by CSR company Bulletproof through Vital For children.

Healthcare - Success Stories:

Success Story 1: Name - Arati Das

Situation before intervention:

Arati Das is a 57 year old woman who belongs to the economically weaker sections of the society. She works in a Self-Help Group and cooks Mid-day Meals for school children. Her husband works at a waste collection company. When they used to fall sick, they usually took some rest and relied on home remedies to get well rather than seeking medical help. The town hospital was too far to go. Also skipping work would mean losing a day's wage which they could not afford.



Intervention made:

Since 2000, the year in which ARWS was founded; our organization has taken steps to counsel people and provide free basic health care. Therefore a clinic was set up along with a drug store that lends out prescription medicine for free in the village itself. Established doctors from the city visit the clinic on a regular basis and provide basic medical treatment to the people or refer them to other hospitals for further treatment.

Turning Point:

Arati was experiencing pain in the joints and was finding it difficult to do her daily chores. She was having a hard time while standing up from a sitting position. She tried applying balms to the sore areas but this proved futile. Finally she came to the clinic and got herself diagnosed by the doctor. The doctor prescribed nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAID) and advised her to do some free-hand exercises.

Challenges faced & overcome:

Initially, she was having trouble in doing the free-hand exercises and since she was doing it for the first time, it was a little painful. To help her heal faster Anirban Rural Welfare Society arranged for the services of a physiotherapist who showed her the correct way to do the exercises and since then the pain has started reducing.

Present Status:

Arati Das has expressed that the medicines and exercises helped reduce the pain to great extent. She is now on the road to recovery and is really grateful to ARWS for intervening and helping her heal.

Healthcare - Success Stories:

Success Story 2: Name - Akash Mondal

Situation before intervention:

Akash Mondal is a 10 year old boy whose family comprises of his parents and himself. His mother is a domestic worker and his father is a fisherman who also sells fish at the local market. Being chubby in those areas is actually considered a good sign, since most of the children are undernourished. But there is a difference between a healthy child and an overweight child which the parents failed to understand until Akash showed some signs of physical discomfort. Since the town hospital was too far from their home, they wanted to come to the clinic, as it was nearer and they did not have to miss their work.



Turning Point:

Akash was consistently gaining a lot of weight and as a result having some physiological problems. He was becoming lethargic and experiencing heavy sweating and loss of breath. He came to the ARWS Clinic along with his mother. The doctor found out that he has a family history of obesity and diabetes. His BMI was also quite high. The doctor prescribed a strict diet for him and showed him some exercises to be done regularly so as to lose weight.

Challenges faced & overcome:

Akash had to give up some of his favourite food and follow the diet plan strictly. He used to get sad sometimes when he craved for his favourite food but could not get them. His parents were very patient with him and encouraged him to lose weight and follow the diet plan that the doctor recommended.

Present Status:

Akash has been exercising regularly. He does not feel lethargic anymore. Though losing weight takes time, he is hopeful that he can reach his ideal body weight and be as fit as his other friends in the village soon.

Healthcare - Success Stories:

Success Story 3: Name - Babai Sardar and Rita Sardar

Situation before intervention:

Babai Sardar is a 2 years old boy who belongs to an economically weaker section of the society. His mother, Rita Sardar works as a domestic worker while his father Tarak Sardar works as a construction worker. Babai has an elder sister Pooja who is just 5 years old. Mr. and Mrs. Sardar have to go to work every day since they get paid on a daily basis. The nearest hospital that is in the town is quite far from their village. And since there is only a single hospital in that area, it is usually crowded. Patients need to wait long hours to meet the doctors and have to stand in long queues to get their prescription medicines.



Turning Point:

Babai was suffering from cough and cold along with a runny nose. He frequently had bouts of fever. He became very weak and his sense of taste was also impaired. He came to the clinic with his mother early in the morning and got examined by the doctor. The doctor prescribed low doses of paracetamol along with cough syrup. Some vitamins had also been prescribed to him along with a diet plan.

Challenges faced & overcome:

Since the child could not smell the flavours of the food due to a blocked nose and had impaired taste, he was not interested in having his meals. He was weak and only wanted to lie down and rest. But his parents made sure that he took his food and medicines regularly.

Present Status:

Mrs. Rita Sardar expressed that her child has recovered a lot after the administration of the medicines. He has regained his strength and is playing a lot more. He remains happy throughout the day and is now eating well.

Nutrition Drive - Reduction of Malnutrition:



Project:

ARWS conducts 12 nutrition drives in a year due to which 3600 children from the age group of 3 years to 16 years have been benefited.

Geographical Area:



24 South Parganas, West Bengal

Objectives:

The main hurdle in improving the living conditions for women and children in our project area is increasing the level of awareness in a community that is largely uneducated and thus resistant to change.

In India, infant mortality and malnutrition among young children below the age of five is due to greater susceptibility to infections. This correlation is most visible in rural communities and BPL families. Scientific evidence has clearly proved that the chronic effects of malnutrition can be reversed by providing nutritional supplements in the first few years of a child's life. Through its advocacy and awareness programmes and through direct intervention ARWS attends to children at risk of severe malnutrition by providing them with nutritious meals, nutritional supplements and free medical advice.

Beneficiaries and Achievements:

There are 3 self help groups that have been set up by ARWS. From the community vegetable gardens and fields, food grains and vegetables are obtained which are cooked and served at the nutritional health care centres by dedicated cooks and caretakers. The growth of children is monitored regularly and a record of height and weight is maintained. Since the past one year, malnourished children have also been provided with vitamin supplements and health drinks along with nutritious meals. The mid-line assessment has shown an increase in their height and weight as per their ages.



Sanitation:



Objectives:

• To improve the health and hygiene practices of students in primary and secondary education centres by facilitating the construction of sanitation facilities, education and an accountability process which will ensure their continuing use, care and maintenance.

Activities:

- Constructed sanitation facilities with three toilet chambers and septic tank for 300 children.
- Advocacy on best hygiene practices for boys and girls were conducted.
- · The toilets were designed to ensure accessibility for small children
- Advocacy was conducted on the following topics: Usage of toilets, importance of flushing, best anal cleansing practices, importance of hand washing, safe water handling and storage, why open defecation should be discouraged, preventing water borne diseases, garbage disposal etc,
- Due to our intervention hygiene education is a part of the school curriculum, the methodology was based on living conditions and daily behaviour.

Achievements:

- Children and women in nearby villages have access to safe and arsenic free water.
- Reduced number of incidents of sickness and waterborne disease in adults and children in the community due to improved sanitation. This will result in increased productivity and reduction in health related debt burden in a few years time.
- · Improved access to clean water in Gondia.
- Improved hygiene standards and decreased absenteeism resulted in an improvement in the teaching and learning environment for students and teachers.






















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
